Dear Friends,

This is the last time that I will be speaking to you through St Columba's magazine. In Early August, Anna and I will be moving 240 miles north to Sutherland to start a new chapter in my ministry. For many of us, myself very much included, the past three years has been a very rewarding time, but it has fair flown by, and I will miss very much the congregation that has nurtured and matured me in my ministry.

In life, it is very tempting to spend much of our time either thinking with joy or regret about what is past or anticipating or worrying about what is to come. As Christians however our hope is very much rooted in the present. We are called to live in the here and now; to be fully present to one another in our worship together, in our social interactions and with everyone that we meet.

At the centre of our faith is the Eucharist. What we celebrate in the Eucharist is not simply the remembering of something in the past. What we are doing is making our Lord Jesus Christ fully present amongst us. The Eucharist is an Anamnesis, a Greek word that means remembrance but very much in the sense of making present, rather than simply remembering or reminiscing. As Archbishop Anastasios wrote:

“The anamnesis is not a simple intellectual function; it is an action. As members of the Eucharistic community we recall again to consciousness the economy of God in Christ through the Holy Spirit, the incarnation, the crucifixion, the resurrection of Christ, his ascension, and Pentecost. We live them. We share in them. We do this not through our own human abilities but through the grace of God in the Holy Spirit.”

As we each move on to our own challenges in the months and years to come, we can remember the time that we have spent together and the ways in which we have enriched each others lives, as we celebrated Christ present amongst us. We have all much to be grateful for.



Thanks, Celtic Accord!

Many thanks to those who supplied such fitting music at the last session of the season for Largs Monday Toddlers. Local musicians, Celtic Accord, joined us for the Teddy Bears' Picnic, singing and playing familiar tunes including 'that one'! David (mandolin) and Irene (guitar and vocals) McCullough, and Armorel Allen (cello and recorder) are occasionally joined by other players and have performed at a variety of venues, including Largs Sailing Club and McHuills, Glasgow. This was their first teddy bears picnic though!

Notes of the Mission Action Planning Review held on 7th June 2015

There were 24 members present

The Rector welcomed Bishop Gregor to receive presentations on progress on (i) the prayer and spirituality and (ii) outreach into the community/children and young people strands of the Mission Action Plan. It was noted that our goals this year were:

1. To set up Columba's Creatives
2. To explore further and design the making of a labyrinth and
3. To explore the establishment of a new fellowship group based around discussion on films.

New Fellowship Group

The Rector advised that this new Group was being established by Gib FitzGibbon and in Gib's absence he read a progress report submitted by Gib. In his report Gib advised that the intention was to have a social format where the Group would watch a film over two meetings and have an informal discussion over refreshments after each. The first film was to be Hotel Rwanda over two Sunday evenings but those expressing an interest in attending were very low, possibly due to insufficient advance notice. He had circulated a paper to gauge availability for different evenings but only four responses were received. It was still intended to pursue setting up the Group as the film made on the life of Ann Guthrie had now premiered in Canada, where it won best film in its category, and Edinburgh and could now be shown locally, possibly on an ecumenical basis through Largs Churches Together as Ann was well known in Largs.

In response to the Bishop's question as to why the initial setting up of the Group didn't work members present highlighted family commitments, particularly on a Sunday evening. A suggestion that two copies of a film be purchased and circulated with a date to meet as a Breakfast Club was also made.

The Bishop suggested that as an alternative to films the MAP Group may wish to explore setting up a Book Group on the same basis as this would only involve advertising the book to be read, the timescale for reading and when to meet to discuss.

Create a Largs Labyrinth

The Rector advised that a labyrinth was a place of reflection for all where the world is left behind as you journey the paths, taking stock as you go and returning to the everyday with a new perspective. A labyrinth made with rope had been set up at last year's Viking Festival and proved popular. The proposal was to clear the ground behind the Hall and provide a pathway with stone stations where people could stop and contemplate for which funding of £3,500 was required. Photographs were shown of the area along with a possible layout. Alice McDonald and her husband John have been removing and bagging compost from the area and had raised over £135 to date which was warmly applauded. William was seeking funding for the project and a package was being pulled together to make it attractive to funding bodies.

Jane McCance gave a presentation on the historical origins of Labyrinths in the 12th to 14th Centuries with a grass one locally in Cumbrae and one established inside St. Paul's Cathedral in 2000. She stressed that the labyrinth would be available to the people of Largs and visitors to the town and that it could be used for story-telling or other ideas. At the moment the project was at an early planning stage and ideas and expertise to bring the project to fruition would be welcomed.

Members present suggested that a sensory garden be considered in the plans and that all paths be wide enough to accommodate a wheelchair.

Bishop Gregor encouraged the MAP Group to work up and submit the plans and a grant application to the Regional Council as it was linked to the MAP and there were funds set aside to support such projects. The Treasurer advised that he also intended to seek funding from the Regional Council for repairs to the wall in the Rectory garden as appropriate.

Columba's Creatives

The Rector advised that Columba's Creatives first met on 27th August 2014 as Messy Church had been discontinued due to a number of issues but primarily because numbers attending had been disappointing. They meet every Wednesday during term time from 6 to 7 p.m. and had met 35 times to date. It is a place for school aged children to meet together, to learn, play and get creative and a number of photographs were shown of their activities including when Bishop Gregor had visited the Club. The Club has been a great success with consistent numbers.

Susan and Sophie Birch spoke on their enjoyment of the Club which they had found through Facebook as it allowed both Sophie and her younger sister Lucy to attend together. Susan commended the Club and also the Church itself for being so welcoming and engaging for her and the children. This had brought Susan, Sophie and Lucy to Baptism, Susan to Confirmation and others had attended Church services. Jamie McCart from St John's Church was assisting at the Club to achieve his Boys Brigade Queen's Badge.

Bishop Gregor suggested that the MAP Group might wish to consider being more proactive by linking the Club with the Church building. The Bishop commended this initiative and suggested an application be made to the Diocese for assistance with funding materials such as play equipment and musical instruments. The Rector advised that funding provided by the Diocese for Messy Church had been used to get Columba's Creatives started..

The Bishop enquired as to what the members had learned this year. The response was that some things take time to mature, seeds are sown but there is a waiting process. The Monday Toddlers Club for example had arisen from a need which had been identified and due to the volunteers was now thriving and was being very well attended.

The Bishop concluded the Review by remarking that the Church appeared to have a happy congregation with togetherness and a desire to do God's work to the very best standard with the limited resources available. He thanked everyone for their attendance and hospitality and for the presentations which he had found very informative and encouraging.

In conclusion he asked for everyone's prayers for the General Synod meeting in Edinburgh where they would be discussing whether to adopt same sex

marriage into the life of the Church and for himself as he leads the discussion as Chair of the Faith and Order Board.

The meeting closed with The Grace.

CHURCH LIBRARY

Latest additions, Summer 2015.

Over the Spring months the Library gathered a larger than usual number of books. I am glad to say they cover a wide range of styles and topics - something for everyone?

Commentaries, etc.

THE BIBLE SOCIETIES *Bibleworld Experience; the Gospels and Acts told by Luke*. This rather dumpy book is basically the Biblical text, but broken up by headings into logical readings. (B484).

Ancient Lands - History/Geography.

BROWNRIGG, Ronald. *Come, see this place; the ideal Companion for all Travellers to the Holy Land*. This is a second edition, 1988, of a "compact but exhaustive guide". As well as coloured illustrations it has sketch maps and quotes from pilgrims' prayers. (C485).

THIEDE, Carsten Peter. *Heritage of the first Christians; tracing early Christianity in Europe*. Almost "coffee table" in its format, this book is rich in coloured illustrations. It includes recent researches and brings "...evidence for Christianity's impact on Roman society. (C486).

VERMES, Geza *The Dead Sea Scrolls; a selection of original Manuscripts*. This hard back book in a slip case discusses how they were found and the reactions to them. It then gives them in translation. Several hymns are included from the manuscripts. (C487).

Recent History and General Overviews.

GRASS, Tim *Modern Church History*. This book aims to give a "student-level introduction" from 1648. Its "wide and inclusive approach" takes in Protestant, Catholic and Orthodox Churches, and has extensive coverage of Eastern Churches and modern movements. (D488).

Inspirational Writings.

ARNOLD, Johann Christoph *Rich in Years; finding peace and purpose in a long life*. Himself in his 70s, the author presents stories of people who, in growing older, have found both peace and purpose. (F489).

HOCKEN, Peter. *Blazing the Trail; where is the Holy Spirit leading the Church?* Written originally for a retreat of Roman Catholic priests, this book looks at how the wider Church is becoming more evangelical and ecumenical. "If you are depressed about the Church you should read this book!" (F490).

HOUSTON, Frank. *The Release of the Human Spirit*. The author is a naturalised Australian, born in New Zealand, who began ministering in the Salvation Army. "Are you ready to deepen your relationship with Jesus?" The "break out" is from such things as mental limitations and from fear. (F491).

HUGHES, Selwyn. *Spoken from the Heart; powerful talks and addresses...* The book is a collection of sermons by a travelling preacher. They are said to have... changed the lives of many people around the world. A CD of one sermon is included. (F492).

TUTU, Desmond. *In God's Hands*. This book was recommended for an award by the Archbishop of Canterbury. (F493).

General/Miscellaneous.

BOULARD, Henri. *All is Grace; God and the mystery of time*. An Egyptian Jesuit discusses the most basic of all questions, the nature of Time. Topics range from scientific problems, through coping with the past to facing the future. (H494).

Individual Lives.

O'LOUGHLIN, Thomas. *Saint Patrick; the man and his works*. Was St Patrick indeed the true apostle of Ireland, or "a Christian bishop from the embattled edge of a crumbling (Roman) empire?" The author examines the saint's own writings making us realise that his theology is "no less relevant to our own time". (I495).

DVD.

We now also have in DVD format, copied from the original Videos, *A Year in the Life of St Columba's Scottish Episcopal Church, Largs, 1995* and *The Ordination of Priests, 1994*. The first is now nostalgic, featuring our then Rector, Gregor Duncan. The latter (unfortunately of poor quality at first), is of historic interest as it records our own Joyce Pow being ordained the Priesthood. (DVD6/DVD7)
